Next Century Campaign: Strengthening Our Community, Preserving Our Heritage!

In 2028, the ECOC will celebrate its 100th anniversary and we hope to celebrate the end of a successful capital campaign. We have an ambitious goal of \$1.5 million to make our houses more safe, comfortable and affordable long into the future. But we also want to build stronger bonds to the ECOC and each other as we celebrate our heritage and dream into the future.

Several years ago, the ECOC board hired a firm to do a comprehensive look at projects needed to keep our buildings safe. They identified \$1.2 million of projects needed in the next 10 years. The board also approved a special fund of \$300,000 to \$500,000 to offer more scholarships and keep room rates low. Together, these will ensure that the ECOC is a living legacy for future generations.
